# MINUTES, SPRING MEETING 2018 BEVERLY ODOM, SECRETARY

The AHS Region 14 spring business meeting was held at the Memorial Presbyterian Church in Montgomery, AL, on Friday, May 26, 2018.

President Terese Goodson called the meeting to order. She announced her upcoming visits to 2 new potential display gardens.

Region Secretary, Beverly Odom, was asked to stand. The Region 14 minutes from October 7, 2017, for the Fall 2017 meeting, were published in *The Dixie Daylily*, Spring 2017 edition. President Goodson asked if there were any corrections to the minutes. There was a motion by Oliver Billingslea, seconded by Henry Little, to accept the minutes and they were approved as published.

Jim Chappell, Regional Treasurer, read the treasurer's report. The ending balance was \$19,267.90. President Goodson asked if there were any corrections to the report. There was a motion to accept the report as stated, and the report was approved.

Brief reports were given as follows:

Regional Publicity Director, Debbie Smith, encouraged AHS members to vote in the 2018 Popularity Poll. The 2017 Poll was published in the Spring 2018 edition of *The Dixie Daylily*.

The Dixie Daylily Editor and Region 14 Director, Oliver Billingslea, thanked everyone for their support and encouraged members to send articles and photos for the Summer/Fall edition of *The Dixie Daylily*. He reported that the deadline would be June 21, 2018.

Henry Little presented Garden Judge Liaison Nancy Chain's report, which encouraged more people to become garden judges. Only 3 people attended the 2 clinics held at the meeting. He also thanked the Billingsleas for hosting the Garden Judges Workshop II.

Exhibition Judges Liaison, John Falck, encouraged more people to become exhibition judges. He also made a motion that for future meetings, people would pay for the clinics upfront with their registration instead of at the meeting. Jason Fleishman seconded the motion, a vote was taken, and the motion was carried.

Historian, Sarah Lunsford – No report.

Membership Chairperson, Glenda Woods, reported that she would be contacting new members to encourage participation in Daylily Clubs, Display Gardens, and to make them aware of our publications.

Protocol, Jack Harrison – No Report.

Youth, Tricia Folks – Reported that 2 youth members were in attendance.

### **Unfinished Business:**

President Goodson thanked the North Alabama Daylily Society for hosting the Fall 2017 Meeting in Huntsville, AL.

Janet Green's resignation as Region 14 Secretary, due to health reasons, was announced.

George Carleton presented the report from the nominating committee for Regional President. The committee nominated Henry Little as the next Region President. President Goodson called for a vote and the nomination was approved.

Phyllis Riddle made a motion to wait on the decision to keep *The Dixie Daylily* separate or make it part of the national publication.

### New Business:

Beverly Odom, Meridian, MS, was named Secretary for Region 14.

Jason Fleishman, Tuscaloosa, accepted the position of AHS Scientific Studies Chairperson for Region 14.

The nominating committee for the new Regional Director was selected. The members are: Chairperson, B.J. Yance, Phyllis Riddle, and Pat Wente. A vote was called and the committee was approved.

President Goodson closed the business meeting.

#### Announcements:

In January, Hattiesburg was named the nation's first official "AHS 'Gold Level' Daylily City."

Donations were made to the AHS general fund, the AHS 100 giving \$100 fund, and the William E. Monroe Endowment Trust Fund by several Region 14 members.

2018 Pop Poll, on-line or by paper ballot, is due to Debbie Smith by September 1.

2018 National AHS Convention, June 6-9, hosted by the Georgetown Area Daylily Club, was held in Myrtle Beach, SC,

Lois Smith, President of The Meridian Daylily Society, announced that the Fall 2018 Region 14 Meeting will be held in Meridian on October 6th at the Northeast Convention Center with accommodations being available at the Hampton Inn. Bill Waldrop of Kennesaw Mountain Daylilies will be the guest speaker.

It was also announced that the Central Alabama Daylily Society has been dissolved.

The meeting was adjourned.

# REGIONAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT OLIVER BILLINGSLEA

The AHS Board of Directors Spring Meeting was held in Myrtle Beach, SC, on June 7, 2018, hosted by the Georgetown Area Daylily Club.

As Chair of Special Projects, I had no new information to report, other than to express continuing hope that a Botanical Garden will offer to establish a Lenington All-American Bed, as many Gardens have done with planting of Stout Medal Winners. Limited funds from AHS are available in support of such a project. The good news is that at least two private gardens in Region 14, those of Connie and Don Montgomery and our new Region 14 Secretary Beverly Odom are developing Lenington collections.

At the Publication Committee meeting, it was announced that work is proceeding on a "Hybridizing 101" book and that a PDF for "Flower Arranging with Daylilies" has been completed. Two new judges' handbooks, Judging Daylilies in the Garden and Daylily Exhibitions became available January 15, and are being sold by Amazon Print on Demand or as E-books. AHS members can download a PDF for free at the AHS Portal store. It was also reported that the sales of single copies of Daylilies: The Fifty Year Affair, Landscaping with Daylilies, Double Daylilies: Twice the Fun, The Illustrated Guide to Daylilies (revised edition), and The Open Form Daylily: Spiders, Unusual Forms and Other "Exotics" have been transferred to Amazon Fulfillment. These publications will now be exposed to the vast Amazon audience, whereas before they were only marketed to the AHS membership. Multiple copies of AHS publications can still be ordered directly through AHS with discounts for 10 or more copies, and a special price has also been set for orders of 5 copies. Kindle copies of these books can be obtained for as little as \$2.99 when purchasing a hard copy from Amazon. As a future project, depending the success of our latest publications, I have given some thought to beginning work on a book on "the full form daylily: miniature, small, and large flowers," but I also realize it would a time-consuming project. The project will largely depend on the availability of photos of these subjects.

As of March 1, Kathy Pinkas of Granite City, IL, accepted the position of Publication Sales Manager, and has been conducting an inventory of all books in storage. She has taken over the mailing of club orders, although single copies must be ordered through Amazon. She can be reached at <a href="mailto:pubsales@daylilies.org">pubsales@daylilies.org</a>. Because Kathy was unable to attend the National Convention in Myrtle Beach, I volunteered to sell as many books as our Publications Chair, Lois Hart, could bring.

AHS has been doing well, partly because of our book publications. As of March 31, 2018, the William E. Monroe Endowment Fund Trust reported a balance of \$786,692.98.

As in many organizations throughout the country, membership continues to decline, albeit ever so slightly in AHS. As of May 14, 2018, AHS had 5,541 members. It is so important that each of us renew our membership for 2019

right away, if we have not already done so. Remember, you have to be a member of AHS to receive *The Daylily Journal*, as well issues of Region 14's *The Dixie Daylily*. I find it disappointing that some Club Presidents in Region 14 are not members of AHS. It would be nice if clubs could offer them a membership, so they would know what is going on in our Region, as well as nationally.

In previous Board action last summer, a new Daylily Ambassador Program was created for the purpose of recognizing events/activities that publicize and promote the daylily in innovative ways that successfully achieve outreach to the general public. In regard to Region 14 in particular, it was approved that the Board bypass all required Daylily City application paperwork and designate Hattiesburg, MS, a Daylily City, at the Gold level. A write-up of the Hattiesburg celebration by Bud Kirkpatrick this past January was featured in this Spring on-line issue of *The Dixie Daylily*.

In respect to the Popularity Poll, the execution of which remains the prerogative of each Region, despite several Regions deciding to revamp their processes (retiring anywhere from one to five daylilies from their poll yearly), Region 14 voted to continue its process of selecting the most "popular" daylilies that grow well in our region, notwithstanding their repeated selection.

Subsequent to the Fall Board Meeting, and thanks to a generous gift, significant improvements have been undertaken regarding our AHS website. Its re-design began in late February and was completed by mid April, although improvements are still being carried out. In connection with its new design, the AHS Board of Directors has ratified "the greater emphasis and use of 'American Daylily Society' in marketing, education, and outreach efforts." I found it amusing that at the Board Meeting in Myrtle Beach most Directors were happy to refer to ADS. However, as we move forward, no immediate plans are being made to change our medals, our books, or our logo, or to eliminate the AHS name altogether.

The AHS Marketing Committee has initiated a cross-membership recruitment plan with the American Horticultural Society and is exchanging full page ads in their society's journal, *The American Gardener*, and in our own publication, *The Daylily Journal*.

At the Fall Board Meeting in Savannah, GA, individuals will once again be selected for various personal awards given annually by the Society. These awards include the Helen Field Fischer Gold Medal for Service, the Bertrand Farr Silver Medal for Hybridizing, the Steve Moldovan Mentoring Award, the Electronic Media Award, and the various Regional Service Awards. The 2018 recipients were announced in June at the National Convention in Myrtle Beach, SC. If you would like to nominate someone for the 2019 awards, your nomination letter must be received by Claude Carpenter, Chair of Awards & Honors, by September 1, 2018. He can accept an electronic submission at awards@daylilies.org, or you may mail your letter to his home address at 6075 Vickery Pt., Cumming, GA 30040.

# Receives the AHS Region 14 Service Award

The following is an excerpt from the letter sent to the AHS Board of Directors nominating Debbie D. Smith for the 2018 AHS Regional Service Award for Region 14:

"Besides being an AHS member since 2009, Debbie Smith is a member of three Region 14 daylily clubs: MS Gulf Coast Daylily Society, Hattiesburg Area Daylily Club, and the Mobile Hemerocallis Society. She has served as an officer in the MSGCDS club, and has been a member there since about 2004. According to Bonnie Lingel, current MS Gulf Coast president, 'I have never met anyone who is more organized and more talented' than Debbie. 'She is the lynch pin for all of the activities on the MS Gulf Coast.' Bonnie frequently consults with Debbie about club agendas, speakers, etc. She is a valuable resource.

"In addition to being a general resource, Debbie has been instrumental in planning for the many annual daylily shows on the Gulf Coast. She has assisted in all operations, and also enters/exhibits in these shows, and has worked especially hard on placement and tabulation. John Falck, a former regional president, noted that Debbie has always been a strong supporter of the Mobile Hemerocallis Society.

"Oliver Billingslea commented that Debbie has submitted several well written articles, all unsolicited, for publication in *The Dixie Daylily*. "God's Glory Garden: The Trip to Display Status" was a tribute to the garden of the late C.P. Winters (former Region 14 president), and her husband Bill. Debbie's "A Show is More Than Just One Day: The 2015 MSGCDS Show" is a treasure trove of information about the scenes requirements for planning and hosting an AHS daylily show. Oliver also noted how promptly Debbie answers all emails and calls. She has been very informative in he communications to club presidents, the Regional Director, and to members. She publicized and disseminated the Popularity Poll in memos, on the Region 14 website, and in the newsletter.

"When Linda Carleton, president of the Montgomery Area Daylily Society, requested assistance in planning for the 2018 Spring meeting in Montgomery, Debbie graciously volunteered to drive up from the coast to serve as a resource for the meeting. Her input was invaluable for finalizing a budget and for insuring that the required programs and clinics would be available. Debbie's organizational skills will show, once again, as they did in Hattiesburg for the Spring 2017 and for the Fall 2016 meeting. Whether that meant soliciting donated plants for auction, designing award certificates, ensuring that all awards were available, setting up head tables or speaker's needs, Debbie is a non-stop workhorse and a pleasure with whom to work.

"When C.P. Winters became too ill to continue serving as Region 14 president, Debbie stepped up to the plate and finished the remainder of her term. She then jumped right back into her strong role as Regional Publicity Director

for the region. Debbie was also quite instrumental in assisting at God's Glory Garden by digging, dividing, and transferring C.P.'s Stout and Lenington Award winning daylily beds to a new home in "The Montgomery Garden," home of Connie and Don Montgomery in Hattiesburg, MS. Other daylilies were also prepped during MANY long hours for use at regional and club sales and auctions.

"I'm sure I could find statements from additional club members around AL/MS to add to the few items I have listed. As Bonnie Lingel also stated, 'Debbie won't take any credit.' She might not take the credit, but I will give her that well deserved credit through this Region 14 Service Award nomination."

# A Country Experience in a Suburban Community by Marie Updike

The Carleton Garden is located in the suburban community of Pike Road, Alabama, 16 miles east of Montgomery. Their current home was built in 1991 after they purchased 15 acres in 1988. Subsequently, some of the landscaping and the new, small gardens close to the house were planted. Their acreage started out in the country, but Pike Road has expanded and now surrounds the Carleton's woodland property.

Before delving into a description of the exquisite gardens that today exhibit such beauty in our garden writeup, a bit of history is first provided.

Linda Carleton, a member of the Capital City Master Gardener Association, initially became interested in registered daylilies after Georgia Rehnberg, a grower of daylilies from Coosada, Alabama, gave a daylily presentation. Linda purchased her first daylilies from her. A few years later, a fellow CCMGA member, Terese Goodson, invited Linda to attend a meeting of the Montgomery Area Daylily Society. It wasn't until 2011 that the Carletons joined the daylily club and the American Hemerocallis Society. All the signs were there for daylily addiction, and over time, they enthusiastically began expanding the gardens and purchasing registered daylilies. This led to a desire for blooms with brilliant, solid colors, especially the yellows and oranges, plus plants with strong scapes. Their "thing" or obsession with daylilies took off seven years ago after George installed more landscaping changes and a huge raised garden bed in addition to the beds he had already installed as a gift to Linda for graduating from the CCMGA 2008 intern class. The Carleton's visited Terese Goodson's gardens, read issues of the The Dixie Daylily magazine edited by Oliver Billingslea, and with a thorough knowledge of daylilies, then expanded their daylily beds. As of June, 2018, the Carletons have planted approximately 176 daylily cultivars. Hemerocallis 'Curious George' (Peat 2001) is one of Linda's favorite daylilies. George expressed a penchant for H. 'Jolly White Giant' (Ciavarelli 1984).

George's background as an architect included working with several successful architecture firms in New York, Florida, and Montgomery, Alabama. Linda is a retired educator, with previous work as a school psychometrist. She has been a member of the CCMGA since 2008, receiving her gold badge in 2012. Her activities in the CCMGA include focusing on plant sales, managing the intern program, as well as holding the office of treasurer. Linda enjoys ceramics which she makes for her six grandchildren, ages from two to twenty. In 2018 she was nominated "Citizen of the Year" by the Pike Road Civic Club. Her long-time civic club involvement includes serving as president for two years, first vice-president for two years, and for two years she has helped organized the Pike Road Arts and Crafts Fair. As a MADS member, she was first vice president for two years and then president for 2017 and 2018. George and Linda display leadership and strong organization qualities which has fostered effective teamwork between them and many accomplishments.

The next phase of their lives will focus on downsizing, making the gardens and home easier to maintain. Previously, their combined goals were to expand, but now, appropriately, as both are retired, their joint goals are spending more time with grandchildren and traveling. Still, the Carletons enjoy the surprise that daylilies offer each spring as the plants come alive, grow and send up blooms. So, daylilies will continue to be a focus in the gardens.

Linda says George has a natural knack for gardening and maintaining the three-acre landscaped site. That includes procuring "super soil" or tussling with weeds. Upon first arriving at the gardens, a visitor might initially experience amazement at the sensational expanse of gardens surrounding their gracious home, evidence of George's gift and his successful results, then feel a sense of joy from the peacefulness in seeing lakes and ponds in all directions. George, who grew up on Long Island, New York, was exposed to gardening by his father and uncle, who grew vegetables. His knowledge of good gardening techniques could be a mantra for maximizing a home garden. A handful of his revered words might be: "Begin with really, really, really good soil. Weed early and often. Use the right tools. Water efficiently and often." Listening to George's step-by-step guide takes away the mystery of common gardening tutorials.

Super what, you say? That's "super soil" which George orders from Froggy Bottom Materials, locally owned and operated by Zeb King and Ben Lassiter, 1010 Cook Station Rd., Montgomery, AL 36117, Phone: 334-215-FROG (3704). The list on the Internet for their recipe mixture is: "Super Soil (PH 6.8) = 1/3 mix of mushroom compost, pine-bark mulch fines and washed sand." George finds it a wonderful way to amend Alabama clay soil and has ordered truckloads for almost every garden bed. He says it creates exceptional growing conditions, and some beds now have a loam appearance, like a forest floor. Zeb King says, "It is especially effective with alkaline gumbo soil; the blend never gets too hot, and we take care with the mixing, sifting and grinding of materials. There's rarely an issue with weeds as super soil does not have any top soil in it." Super soil is a highly amended growing medium that George applies over a base of chicken manure in the daylily beds. Liquid nutrients are almost never necessary because super soil is a well-balanced, nutrient rich soil mixture which grows thick, strong plants that increase quickly. Some double fan daylily cultivars planted last fall have tripled the number of fans in a clump. The impact of super soil is evident in the vigorous daylily clumps, as they are receiving both macronutrients and micronutrients, a necessity for viable plant growth. It is the ideal mixture for plants.



# Otis Acres: The Garden of Linda and George Carleton by Marie Updike

Tay 26, 2018, was a lovely day when the Carletons welcomed the AHS Region 14 Spring Meeting bus tour participants to their Okfuski Trail domain. According to the Region 14 program, "Daylilies—Bringing Color to the River Region," the Carleton Gardens are "affectionately referred to as 'Otis Acres' by family members and nicknamed after a beloved German Shepard called 'Otis'." The house "sits atop a hillside overlooking Lake Cameron in the town of Pike Road, with sweeping views visible for miles." Standing at the highest point of the property near the house, the awe-inspiring portrait of house, gardens, hills and trees hark back to perfect scenery for an outdoor ceremony. The best view is from the swing in a shaded part of the garden. The placement of the house, tool shed and gardens is a natural layout as a result of the surrounding woodland topography.

Nothing builds enthusiasm for a daylily group like seeing masses of daylily blooms as they step off the bus. Guests listened to their hosts explain that each garden bed or patch has a special meaning to Linda and George. Large clumps of daylily cultivars listed on the Region 14 Popularity Poll Ballot for 2018 were in bloom: 'Alabama Jubilee', 'Double Blue Blood', 'J.T. Davis', 'King Kahuna', 'Lava Flow', 'Moses' Fire', 'Orange Velvet', 'Suburban Nancy Gayle', 'Tangerine Horses' and 'Webster's Pink Wonder'. Numerous daylily cultivars were obtained from fellow MADS member Evelyn Miller when she downsized, and there were special daylily purchases from Alabama, Mississippi, Florida, Georgia and Texas. Almost every year MADS has a bus trip at which time the group tours a southern region with the purchase of daylilies as a goal.

Many of the guests on the tour that day complimented the Carletons on the ambiance which they experienced. shade and a peaceful place to retreat. There are holly ferns,

iris, and canna lilies all dispersed with more daylilies, wherever enough sunlight is possible.

Yard art encouraged visitors to observe the gardens at a closer perspective and provided interesting venues. Various planters, iron figurines, a large metal flower, benches, and several urns were purchased from different shopping trips. Some of Linda's special items in the gardens are things she created in ceramics class. The prized birdhouse constructed by MADS member Arthur Woods will last because it is made of cedar. It has attracted a pair of birds who are currently nesting and egg sitting.

The Sally Lake Memorial Award Bed offered up some great seedling plants from various Region 14 hybridizers. So many beauties were in bloom on tour day, but one stood out: Number 52, a seedling from Martha Brazelton. It was covered with many buds and beautiful peachy colored blooms that had a rose eye, rose ruffled edge and green

throat. Seedling number 16 displayed huge red blooms with big yellow ruffled edges and a yellow throat. Seedling number 33 had very impressive blooms on tour day; it was of a medium rose color, with white ribbing and a yellow ruffled edge with a big yellow throat. Prior to building the SLMAB, George had to consider the clay soil, the installing of underground soaker hoses, and placement of timbers on a sloped area. The existing daylilies growing in that area were to be dug and moved to a different location. To build the new SLMAB, George constructed raised beds with timbered sides, followed by a truckload of super soil placed over chicken manure.

Following the pathways through the garden, there are many other plants, trees and bushes. Two Toomer's Corners oak trees were planted in 2012 as offspring/rooted from the original Auburn University trees. In shaded areas they planted a number of Japanese Maple trees at various times, one of which was acquired from Pat Dye, former Auburn football coach. Nearby are hostas, ferns, pots of geraniums, and impatiens around the patio. The sun patiens were spectacular having been planted around the borders of the pecan tree, ash trees and others. The gently sloping lawns run down into beautiful hay fields. George uses a zero turn mower to cut both lawns and fields, and installed above ground drip hoses in most of the gardens. Daylilies moved to make way for the SLMAB were planted around a "marriage tree" bed. The center of that bed, a stately Magnolia tree, was planted on the day of George and Linda's marriage. The bed includes numerous, large daylily clumps, abundant blooming blue salvia and a large band of hardy ferns as the bed receives sun from all sides. Blooming on tour day in this bed were Hemerocallis 'South Sea Enchantment', H. 'Spider Man' and many other named cultivars. Visitors made choices casting ballots for specific clumps for specific awards. At the awards banquet, the Carletons received the following awards for daylily clumps grown in their garden during the tour: the Amy Stewart Memorial Award for the best clump of a registered pink daylily, ('South Sea Enchantment');

As you come down the long drive lined with hackberry trees, you are greeted by beautiful beds full of daylilies and numerous companion plants such as pink canna, coleus, purple coneflowers, hosta, artemisia, elephant ears, and heuchera.

Generous beds of daylilies bordered with stone and punctuated with ornamental trees surround the house. The bed in front of the house features a Japanese Maple as a centerpiece to compliment the daylilies.

# The Garden of Oliver and Nancy Billingslea by Nancy Falck

Having visited the Billingslea's garden quite a few times before, I was anxious to see it in bloom for this year's Region 14 Spring Regional Meeting. I was certainly not disappointed. The garden was meticulously planted and groomed in anticipation of the two buses loaded with daylily enthusiasts armed with cameras, phones, and notepads.

When the bus stopped at the drive, Oliver greeted us and told us a little about the garden. Everyone trooped out of the bus and began the walk up the tree lined driveway. Along the way we passed drifts of bright yellow Black-eyed Susans lighting up the trail. Their bright yellow lighted the way through the wooded entry.

The tall blue purple of 'Amistad' and the 'Mystic Spires Blue' salvia plants were a perfect foil for the colorful daylilies. Contrasting the cool blues were the hotter red and yellow of 'Arizona Sun' gallardia. The circle birdbath bed contained 'Chapel Hill' yellow lantana and 'Adam Saul' echinacea. Other interesting plants are spaced throughout the beds.

One special feature of this garden is the use of smooth river rocks as plant markers. The name of each day-lily is carefully lettered on the rocks in white paint. These markers are a unique way to make the markers as unobtrusive as possible while still being easy to read.

The warm colors of the daylilies were complemented with blue 'Mystic Spires Blue' salvia, the taller purple 'Amistad' salvia, and single specimens of a lavender sun patiens and a silvery green artemisia. As we topped the hill, mounds of color in three beds beckoned to us. Crossing the manicured lawn, we headed wherever our gazes led us. Each bed was surrounded by small mounds of 'Gin' and 'Whiskey' begonias and 'Profusion Double White' zinnias. This outline was a good reminder not to step into the beds for photo opportunities even though each daylily and companion plant was ready for its portrait to be taken.

In a palette-shaped bed, the complementary colors of two award winning daylilies attracted numerous photographers. The bright yellow of Sandy Holmes' 2012 registration, *Hemerocallis* 'Tidewater Elf', with a hint of tangerine, attracted immediate attention. This tetraploid is popular everywhere it is seen, having won the President's Cup at the AHS Tidewater National Convention, and now winning our Region 14's President's Cup in the Billingslea Garden.

Nearby, a deeper, darker variety was Karol Emmerich's *H.* **'Song of the Sea'**. This 2018 registration is a rich mulberry self with a lavender halo. It has a double edge of lavender and purple. It was the winner of the Linda Agin Memorial

Award, given for the best clump of a registered purple daylily seen in a tour garden. Another eye-catching daylily was 'Andrew Christian' (Harris-Benz, 1990), which sported twelve blooms. Also, Karol Emmerich's 2007 introduction, 'Entwined in the Vine' attracted its usual crowd of admirers.

Yet another winner in the Billingslea Garden was Pat Stamile's *H.* 'Walter Kennedy' (2008), receiving the Ben Arthur Davis, Sr., Memorial Award for the best clump of a registered eyed or eyed and edged daylily seen in a tour garden.

Several Region 14 hybridizers were featured in the garden. A tall beauty was Terah George's *H.* **'Banana Smoothie'** (2006), which has won several awards including the Ned Roberts Spider/Unusual Form Award at the 2017 AHS national convention. Nancy Falck's small **'Summer Flirtation'** (2016) is a magenta self with an eye of blue purple on the petals and yellow to purple on the sepals. Her

The Billingslea's daylily collection is a carefully chosen mixture of old and new cultivars. There are both tetraploids and diploids as well as miniature, small, large and extra-large flowers. 

# Travels with My Camera: Highlights of Myrtle Beach

In June of this year, I had the pleasure of traveling to Myrtle Beach, SC, to attend the AHS National Convention. As Director for Region 14, it was my duty to participate in the always interesting Board Meeting, but visiting each of the six gardens on tour made the trip especially fun. I got to renew many acquaintances, and for the first time I got to meet the young man, Edvinas Misiukevičius, from Lithuania. He turned out to be my bus companion both days, and we had the opportunity to share a lot of information about daylilies. He has been an active participant in the Daylily Robin for several years and is the artist who did the silk screen painting of *Hemerocallis* 'Heavenly United We Stand' for the Myrtle Beach auction. I also got to meet Professor Zhiguo Zhang of the Shanghai Institute of Technology in China. He was pleased to purchase several of my books and have me sign them. He was most gracious and presented me with a lovely framed copy of a silk screen painting of *H*. 'Kwanso'. John Baker, whom I had met before, was there from Linford, England, and purchased six copies of *The Open Form Daylily* book for British friends.

The first garden we toured was Canterbury Gardens, the garden of Johnny and Odessa Bourne, located in Andrews, SC. Hundreds of plants by numerous hybridizers graced this well-landscaped suburban lot.



T he second garden we visited was Browns Ferry Garden, located in Georgetown, SC. A large commercial daylily nursery and AHS Display Garden, owned and operated by Charles and Heidi Douglas, it features the introductions of Heidi and Charles plus those of Gene Tanner, together with selected favorites used in their hybridizing program. Presently, more than 10,000 seedlings are being evaluated, several of which were outstanding.

It is rare that I feature seedlings in our newsletter, but I found both of these interesting in their own right: the first, #H 14-24, because it sports blooms that are actually opening a day in advance of fully opening; and the second, from Charles Douglas, because it was the winner of the best seedling in the Region 15 competition.

Perhaps the most unexpected garden on the Myrtle Beach tour was the one called "I Can't Believe It's a Dip," owned and operated by Ed Zahler and his friend Duane Thierren. Both fellows were seated at our dinner table, so we struck up a pleasant conversation about their hybridizing programs. Since their garden is located in Conway, SC, less than a mile off Hwy 501, I was able to stop by on Sunday morning a second time on my way back to Montgomery, AL.

Ed Zahler began his hybridizing career developing miniatures, the most famous of which are *H.* 'Dash Dash' (Zahler 1989) and 'Dot Dot' (Zahler 1989). Both were still growing in large clumps at the garden. But in the past several years, he and his friend Duane have begun developing diploids with large flowers that look and perform a lot like tetraploids.

Afourth gorgeous garden, also located in Conway, SC, was Southern Charm Gardens, which are actually two gardens in one. Ann and Marion Howell and Lloyd and Jeanette Howell have created a lovely setting in adjoining yards for their more than 700 cultivars. Jeanette's garden art highlighted the ambiance of the total garden.

In respect to flowers, the highlight of Southern Charm Gardens on the day we visited was Heidi Douglas' diploid, *Hemerocallis* 'Breathing in Snowflakes'. This cultivar was beautiful in several gardens, but especially here. It went on the capture the President's Cup.

Our fifth stop was the Don Albers Garden, located in Murrells Inlet, SC. The property was once a hog farm, a throwback to the days when this part of South Carolina was largely rural. What was most impressive to me in the garden were the Albers seedlings, many of them dark, nearly black. I picked out one that I thought had good branching and good form, and Don agreed in that he had given it a number. What was especially intriguing is that it had a deep burgundy midrib enhancing the black purple flower.

## Brookgreen Gardens

This amazing garden, founded by Archer and Anna Hyatt Huntington, is a jewel amidst the Lowcountry region in South Carolina. Created "to provide a backdrop for Anna's larger than life sculptures," the garden also contains an area devoted to native plants and animals, a butterfly house, and the impressive Live Oak Allée, comprised of 250 year-old live oak trees that were planted in the early 1700s when the

area consisted largely of rice plantations. The total property consists of 9,127 acres, including waterways and woods. According to one source, the collection of sculptures is one of the largest and most comprehensive in the country. Of special interest to Convention attendees was the Daylily Walk, containing a number of plants hybridized by members of the Georgetown Area Daylily Club.







Indeed, there was much nudity displayed throughout the Gardens, but all of it tastefully executed. The gold-clad centerpiece of Dionysus and the panther was beautiful. The Diana Pool featuring the Goddess of the Chase with drawn bow was elegant. The sculpture of Pegasus being tamed by Bellerophon was the largest in size.

In total, there are over 2,000 works in the Gardens by 425 artists. Many of the smaller works are featured in extensive statuary galleries. On the following pages, I have chosen several works which I found exemplary, including the sculpture of Dionysus. They are powerful depictions of the human condition, reflective in Greek, Roman, Hebrew, and Native American mythology.

Oliver Billingslea



Nathaniel Choate (1899-1965) was one of the artists prominently featured at Brookgreen Gardens. Born in Southboro, MA, he attended Harvard University, and as a prominent sculptor later worked with various materials, including aluminum, bronze, marble, and onyx. His "Alligator Bender Sculpture" was executed in 1937 and depicts a young man of Native American descent powerfully in control of the primitive beast in nature and in himself.





Anna Hyatt Huntington (1876-1973) was one of the great American sculptors of horses and animals. Her most famous sculptures include the equestrian statue of "Joan of Arc" (1910), located on Riverside Drive at 93rd Street, New York; "Fighting Stallions" (1950), located at Brookgreen Gardens, SC; and "The Torch Bearers" (1955) at Ciudad Universitaria, Madrid.

Along with her husband, Archer Milton Huntington (1870-1955), she was responsible for founding America's first sculptural garden, the Brookgreen Gardens in South Carolina. Archer, reportedly one of the twelve richest men in America, was very proud of his wife's works, and he wanted to procure a place to display them, along with other works of the Art Deco period. In 1930 they acquired the property needed. Brookgreen Gardens, near Murrrells Inlet, South Carolina, contains one of the best collections of late 19th and early 20th century sculptures anywhere. It was the first garden in America to be devoted exclusively to statuary.
